


- 1. This painting is titled "The Journey". Why do you think that is?

- 3. Métis people were fur traders sometimes called voyageurs. Today, some Métis still hunt and trap. What do you know about Métis people and their importance to the fur trade?






"The Songs of Our Family Tree"

- 3. What do you think the roots, leaves, flowers, and birds in the tree represent?








"The Ingenuity of Moose Hair Tufting"

"Our Stories Extend Beyond Us"




- 1. This painting illustrates the deep connection between the Métis people and the land. What does the title "Our Stories Extend Beyond Us" make you think about?

- 3. The Métis sash holds significant cultural importance. What traditional purposes did the sash serve within the Métis community?






"We are the People of the Land"




- 1. Describe the scene in this painting. Which Métis land-based skill are being illustrated?

- 3. Can you identify additional symbols of Métis identity depicted in this painting?



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


"The Fabric of Our Spirit"
