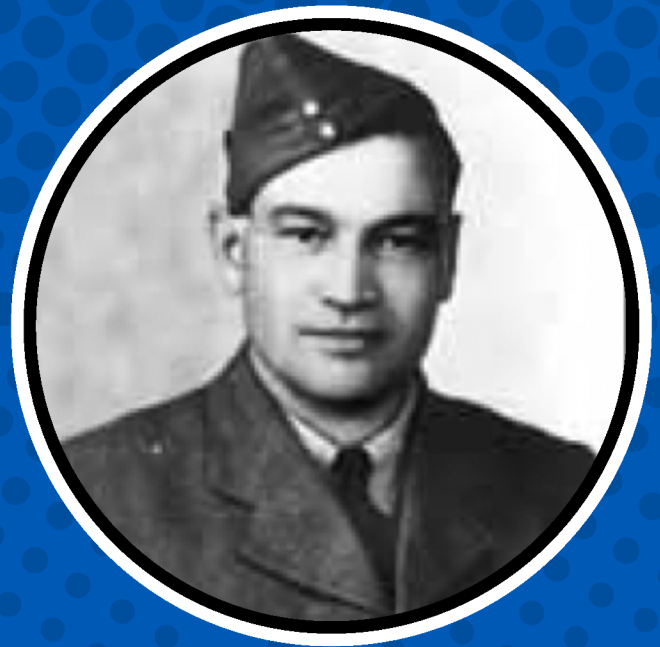

JIM Brady



Jim Brady, a Métis leader born in 1908, vanished in 1967, leaving behind a legacy of advocacy and leadership. Descended from one of Louis Riel's soldiers, Brady was a prominent figure in northern Alberta and Saskatchewan. Engaged in change making politics in the 1930s, he pushed for progressive Indigenous policies within the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation. As a founding member of the Association des Métis d'Alberta et des Territoires du Nord-Ouest, Brady was instrumental in the passage of the Métis Population Betterment Act in 1938. Revered for his role in the Métis liberation movement, his legacy continues to inspire positive change in Métis communities.
