Louis Riel was a prominent Métis leader, politician, and founder of Manitoba. Born in 1844 in the Red River Settlement, he played a central role in defending Métis rights and culture against Canadian expansionist policies. Riel led the Red River Resistance in 1869-1870, resulting in the establishment of Manitoba as a province. He later led the North-West Resistance of 1885, advocating for Métis rights in what is now Saskatchewan. Riel's efforts led to his execution for treason in 1885, but he is remembered as a crucial figure in Canadian history and a champion of Métis rights.
